"Now, when I go on interviews, people always make nice comments about my suits," added the former equity trader.

Klausner on a shopping spree for clothes in Manhattan during the taping of the show in April.

Along with the new attire, Klausner — the father of 7-year-

Klausner got on the show when a friend, former New York Jets quarterback Boomer Esiason, told Klausner's story to a producer friend at Bravo.

Esiason helped the family put together a videotape audition and, according to Klausner, the producers of "Queer Eye" immediately fell in love with the Klausners.

One of Klausner's favorite moments during the taping of the show was watching the Fab Five and Esiason play Twister and Candy Land with his sons in the family's playroom.

Klausner said he is glad the show will allow the story of his illness and survival to be told to a national audience.

"It's a story of inspiration, not some feel-sorry-for-this-guy story," he said.
